Tying for second place and the class A-B prize were Kevin French of Decatur, and Terry Trippe of St. Louis, each with 3.5 points out of 4.

Three people tied for the class C-D prize: Derek Sparks of Middle-town, Jeremy Griffith of Decatur, and Shimin Cao, hometown unknown. They scored 2.5 points out of four. Winning the E-prize, with two points, was Joe Boyd of Woodson. No unrateds participated in this tournament.

A few people showed up on Wednesday, December 5 to play; it seems they were taken in by Chess Life's erroneous announcement of the date of the tournament, and found nothing when they got there! We do not know how many, or how far they came...

Jacksonville News

Jacksonville Championship February 2-3

The Jacksonville Area Chess Club will hold its fifth annual club championship tournament early next month. All four of the tournaments so far have been won by Dr. Kujoth.

The format of the tournament is different than in years past; the tournament is now six rounds over two days; four on Saturday, and two on Sunday. Time control has been lengthened to G/75. And, to avoid a repeat of last year's 11-round marathon, trophies will now be decided by tie-break systems instead of blitz-offs. The places themselves, however, will be shared in case of a tie.

In addition, the tournament is moving to a new site - Illinois College. The departure of Gary and Kevin Vines has meant the old site, the Jacksonville Center for Independent Living, is no longer available.

Clubs To Exchange Newsletters

JACC officer Al Darr, of Carrollton, has started a newsletter, Zwischenzug, for the Jacksonville club. The two clubs will be exchanging newsletters. Copies of their newsletter, which is published quarterly, will be available for inspection at SCC meetings.


Springfield vs. Jacksonville Match No. 3

Our clubs are preparing for their third match. It was originally slated for March, but will probably not be held until May. It is the Jacksonville club's turn to host the match, and the site will again be the Jacksonville Public Library (site of our first match.) There will be a special meeting of the club right before the match.

Absurdity, Part 3

For this exercise, you will need a friend to time you (and to watch you for mistakes.) Move the knight from QR1 to QN1 (possibly via QB2, QR3) and from there to QB1, and so on to KR1. Then go up one rank (to KR2) and back to the queenside. Continue going back and forth, skipping squares occupied or attacked by the pawns, until you finish by going from QN8 to QR8. Never move the knight to a square occupied or attacked by a pawn (10 seconds penalty every time you do so.)

When you try it for the first time, 10 minutes is beginner level, 5 minutes about average, and 2 minutes master level. If you try a second time, a 25 percent improvement indicates strong potential to become a master. I got worse.



Played in Holland, this game appeared in *Chess Life* in 1984. It has no bearing on the Springfield area but is here for its entertainment value. The Wilkes-Barre Defense [324] looks insane, but it has so far defied all attempts to refute it. In this game, however, White sacrifices his queen and marches his king across the board with impunity, though Black missed several possible wins late in the game.


